"We Look Before and After"

IS it possible for the freshmen of the Class of '28 to imagine Hollins without the Little Theater and the Big Gym? Can she picture the first floor of Coker Memorial Library without classrooms and professors' offices, or first floor West without dormitories? Can she think of trips to Roanoke in other terms than "sign out—sign in" in the big, loose-leaved volume reposing on the mail room table, or of week-end visits and dances without conferences in the office of the dean and her able assistant, without pink and blue slips and arrangements for chaperones?

On the other hand, can even such recent alumnae as our sister Class of '23 picture a hockey game at Hollins on Thanksgiving morning immediately after service, a general exodus in the afternoon to the big V. M. I.-V. P. I. struggle in Roanoke, and, to end the day, a hockey banquet with decorations, toasts, and songs in honor of the Odd and Even teams, and, let us add, grateful memories of Lillian Harrison, '23, and Edythe Robertson, '24, and of all they did to put hockey on the map at Hollins? Shades of Yemassee and Mohicans, be a little patient! Basketball is now a midwinter indoor sport, but your day hasn't passed!

Can you of '23 hear the animated table talk at dinner as to "Who's Who" in the swimming pool? Can you think of luncheon hour at 12:15, and laboratory from one until four; of voluntary attendance at meals, unless you are in training; of seniors and juniors chaperoning freshmen to Roanoke in the busses that call for passengers at the Science Hall on Saturday and Monday afternoons; of juniors and even underclassmen having obtained so many privileges that we "wise old seniors" feel that there is scarcely anything left to place us in a class by ourselves?

Can you imagine Y. W. at 11 o'clock Sunday mornings, with discussion groups following instead of assembly at 9:30? Can you imagine "Corgoes" in brave blue wrappings, speeding forth each month from editorial headquarters, instead of "The Hollins Magazine"? Can you think of convocation on Wednesday evenings at seven, with a brief and always inspirational talk by Dean Williamson, and announcements or reports from faculty or student body?

To the incoming freshmen these innovations are already a part of Hollins' "folkways"; they cannot picture Hollins without them, and yet to you graduates of '23, our sister class, whose bonfire before the Grecian Urn will live in the memories of '25, these things connote a Hollins that you never knew, and perhaps make even you, the next youngest of Hollins' alumnae, feel that you belong already to the "good old times," that each succeeding generation of us never fails to dwell on with affection and to boast



of with pride. It is a blessing, too, that each succeeding graduating class delights in pointing to its "good old times," though, as life seems to speed along more and more swiftly, you do seem to be arriving a bit earlier at that place from which one can point back to "the good" and "the old."

We of '25, who have experienced your regime and are now experiencing one that is different, who love the memories that are the heritage of '23, and are rejoicing also in the everwidening opportunities of curriculum and of non-academic activities which the classes of the future will look back upon as their heritage, we whose years as upperclassmen are these two years of rapid change, feel that somehow we understand both eras and can speak with sympathy and enthusiasm for both. We know that you cannot think of Hollins without Miss Parkinson's greeting at the front door of Main. Her retirement last June, after twenty-five years of memorable service, meant necessarily a great change. A generation of Hollins' girls feel grateful for her influence, and returning alumnae are glad to know that not only is she apt to be found somewhere on the campus almost every day, but that they can call at her suite in the Tinker Tea House, where, though busy with plans for both winter and summer tours in Europe and the Near East, she is never too much absorbed to extend a gracious, cordial welcome.

We know, '23, that you would tell our underclassmen, who never knew your "good old days," that no thrill can ever equal that of the Mohicans-Yemassee game on Thanksgiving afternoon, with all Hollins absorbed; the tense atmosphere of that brief hour coming as the climax of excitement that had been gathering momentum since September; the joy of raising aloft the winning captain and bearing her in triumph to the front campus; of seeing the victorious colors float above the front door of Main. These are landmarks in the history of Hollins' athletics. '23, '24, and all preceding classes, for the past twenty-eight years, will tell these later comers that they have missed the greatest thrill of Hollins' out-of-doors; but, despite all this, these later comers and we, along with them, make reply, "There is something finer yet to come; just give us the chance to build it!"

But we know, too, that amid the many innovations there is so much that is unchanged and that must remain unchanged—the traditions that must be kept, the occasions and ceremonies that have grown increasingly dear to Hollins women as each succeeding student body has participated in them, and those features which are a part of the distinctively individual life of each college and are treasured as such. We know that, while we welcome the new, we value and cherish and cling to the old. And after all is said, we know and you know that there is something that does not change, and that is the immortal spirit of youth. This stream of youth, with its efforts, its hopes, and its dreams, that flows in and flows out as years come and go, is and remains the same. The ideas, the ideals, may seem different; we may think ourselves immensely different, and certainly the newspapers and magazines write of us as if nothing of our kind had ever existed before; but below the surface we are just *youth*, finding



our way, stumbling, and picking ourselves up again. Here in our college years we are working, as college youth has always done, with people who are endeavoring to give us insight into the "knowledge that is power," and who are hoping and striving that the coming generations may experience it more fully than the present has been able to do. The real thing that a college means doesn't change, and we truly believe that, despite the turmoil of the day, we are working our way toward enlarged opportunity and vision, and we say to you, dear '23, and to all the other years that have gone out from Hollins, "Come back! In the words of Dartmouth's most distinguished alumnus of many years ago, 'It is a small college, and yet there are those that love it.'"

"There is much in Hollins that you scarcely dreamed of, but there is much, very much, that you know and love. Come back and see!"

Although perhaps a bit alarmed by the combined physical age of our class, and reluctant, too, to accept the finality of commencement, we, this class that Hollins wrought, leave with the ineradicable memory of—

Some Reflections on Graduate Study

HERE are three angles from which a student may view a graduate career: she may see it in prospect; she may regard it as she is actually engaged in it, and she may look at it in retrospect. From each of these angles the outlook is quite different, a fact which is due to the varying degrees of experience and the personal tastes of the individuals concerned.

There are, in general, two classes of students who, as their undergraduate days draw to a close, determine to enter upon courses of graduate study. The first of these is made up of those students who, as they are on the point of receiving their Bachelor's Diplomas, appalled by the vastness of the world which they see ahead of them, suddenly realize that college, after all, is a safe and comfortable place in which to be, and, impelled by a sort of mental inertia, passively decide to sink back for an additional period into the kindly embraces of their Alma Mater or of some sister institution. The second class, on the other hand, is composed of students who, somewhat more eager intellectually than the foregoing, almost joyfully bid farewell to their undergraduate lives, and look ahead to graduate study with an ever-increasing sense of freedom. For such students, graduate study spells *specialization*. During four long years those of literary bent have toiled rebelliously under the burden of required sciences, while their classmates who were scientifically inclined have labored with open resentment at the inevitable English and Latin. But now all of this is at an end, and there lies before each one of them work in her chosen field and in that field only—a welcome relief!

It is at once obvious that those students of the second class will get on better in their new work than those of the first. Those students of the first class, unless their interest in things intellectual is quickened in the very early stages, soon grow bored, stagnate for a time and, at length, overcome by the stress and strain of the work (for a successful graduate career is achieved only by a large outlay of labor), fall by the wayside, never to be revived. Such students abandon college life invariably regretting that they cannot remember it simply as they have known it in their undergraduate days.

It is only the students of the second class who are fortunate enough to get a really fair view of graduate study from the inside. It is a formative period in the lives of these—a time when their minds, heretofore all too carefully guided by painstaking instructors, are beginning to emerge from this spoon-fed method of imbibing knowledge and to learn how to do a little thinking on their own account. These students have placed themselves in the hands of scholars in order that they may be taught the ways of true scholarship, and they yearn to go forth into the world bearing the stamp of scholars. From the start they strive tirelessly and greedily after knowledge. Long vistas of learning stretch ahead of them in every direction; it remains for them only to explore these, to glean what they find there, and to make it their own. It is a period



when moments for intellectual browsing (few though they are) are not unwelcome to them, and there is something highly satisfactory about this new freedom, unencumbered as it is by a mass of uncongenial requirements.

Yet even for the most eager students the period of graduate study leading to a higher degree, enjoyable as it is in most respects, is by no means all a bed of roses. To the majority come awful times of self-revelation and consequent despair. They pass through black moments of realizing for the first time how very little they actually know (they get accustomed to this realization later on), and the body of human knowledge yet to be explored looms like an insurmountable obstacle before them. At this time they instinctively assume an attitude of humility toward the world in general, which hitherto they have never worn. Now and then they may even go so far as to inform the professors who are guiding their intellectual progress that they are firmly convinced that they are exerting their efforts in the wrong direction, but when these professors, who have seen dozens of such cases before, nod wisely and startle them by agreeing (for they invariably do agree), they change their tactics and at once assume for the moment an independent I'll-show-you air. However, the periods of despondency recur and recur frequently. The graduate life is, possibly more than any other manner of existence, a life of ups and downs—a time, therefore, which without doubt is not fully appreciated by a great many students at the time when they are actually experiencing it, for if they but knew it, it is one of the most precious periods through which they have to pass.

Viewed in retrospect, it gradually comes to be so regarded. The average student, after her graduate study is complete and she has capped it off with the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, passes at first through a period when she is obsessed with the idea that she has done it all very badly, and frequently she would be glad indeed to be given the opportunity of wiping out the years just gone by and of trying the whole thing over again. In most cases it is a matter of the student's magnifying her own faults unnecessarily, though it is a feeling natural enough upon emerging from a task which has consumed the student's time and has sapped her energy continually for four long years or even more. Fortunately, however, this feeling is comparatively short-lived, for time, which obliterates most regrets, takes a hand here also, and the student soon begins to look back upon her rapidly receding experiences with an ever-increasing amount of common sense. Out in the world amid a bevy of new interests and the hurly-burly of the performance of new duties which have been shouldered, the one-time all-engrossing importance of the student's graduate study grows dim. Other things of broader outlook and of more unselfish aim take its place; yet the student fully realizes that she would be far less efficiently prepared to participate in these activities, had she not previously acquired the background which she has. She begins to appreciate the value of her study far more now than she has ever done before, and she finds herself instinctively analyzing it, no longer from the standpoint of her own connection with it and its effect upon her, but rather from the standpoint of the value such a career may have for future students who may come her way and be influenced by her.



Here a multitude of questions present themselves. First of all, there is the choice of an institution in which one is to engage in this graduate study. Is it preferable to choose a college or a university in which to obtain this higher learning, and are more satisfactory results to be had by remaining on at one's Alma Mater, provided that she is properly equipped to take one, or by breaking loose from her and independently entering some other institution? These are large and ever debatable problems. Their solution rests, no doubt, with the institution selected, the individual concerned, and the course of study which that individual intends to pursue. There are in this country many universities of outstanding merit, but at the same time, there are plenty of equally worthwhile colleges with graduate schools, and it may conceivably happen that one of these will fulfill the special needs of a particular individual better than another. It must be admitted that all of the departments of one institution are never equally strong, and that whereas one institution may excel along certain lines, another institution may surpass it in others. All of these things should be given due consideration by the student, together with the special field in which she is about to work. The main thing in a graduate course is to get instruction in a chosen field at an institution where that instruction is best suited to the needs of the particular student involved.

Further, there seems to be no reason why she should not remain at her Alma Mater for this work, provided that she is satisfied that she is getting there the best that is obtainable in her especial line. In such a case, however, it is both advisable and advantageous for the student, before she completes her work for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, to have at least a year's study at some other institution. Such a change is beneficial to her in many ways. It gives her an opportunity of gaining a little independence, and of proving to herself and those interested in her that she is capable, so to speak, of standing on her own feet. At her Alma Mater her ability for scholarship has, no doubt, been established to some extent during her undergraduate days, and it is sad but true that that fact may do much to keep her afloat as a graduate student there. By a change, however, she is thrown with new instructors and new classmates, and she no longer has her past to help her out. She has, in a word, to create a series of entirely new impressions on entirely new people. This fact alone strengthens her, but in addition, at the same time that she is having to convince these new people of her ability, they are reacting upon her. She is constantly obtaining new ideas from them; she is being shown new methods of doing things; she is having new problems presented to her; she is seeing minds with which she is unfamiliar at work. Naturally her whole vision is broadened by these contacts, and her work can scarcely fail to profit by them. To put it briefly, the change freshens her up by giving her new stimuli—a thing profitable indeed, for one of the serious dangers of graduate life is that the student, by her continued pursuance of one line of work, will grow stale.

This leads directly to another point which the speculative student, as she looks back over her own graduate career, cannot fail to ponder. Is graduate study too specialized? Is too much time devoted to the intricate details of one or two subjects to the neglect of all others, by the student who is a candidate for a higher degree?

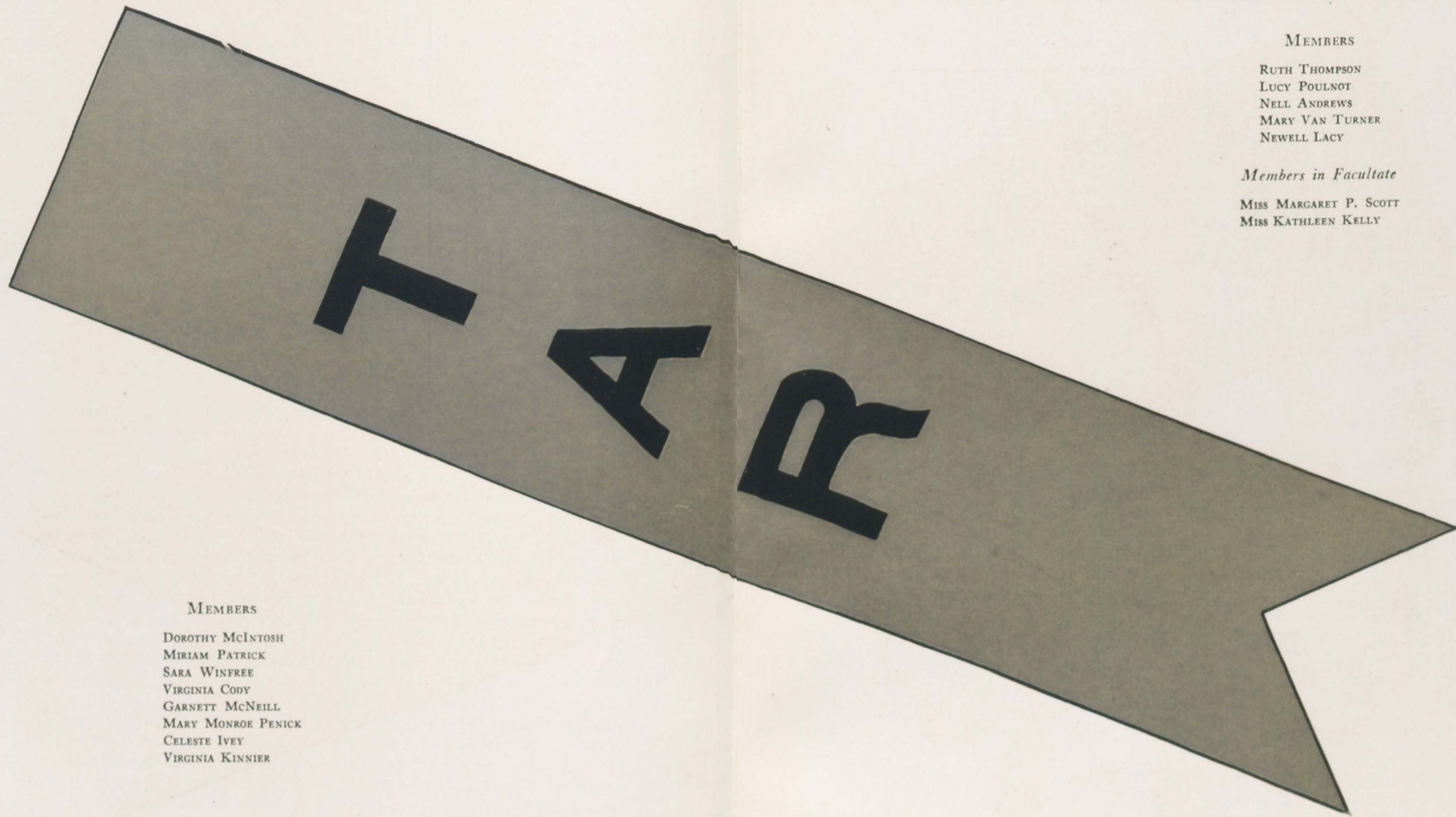


Is there a tendency for her, through the great amount of specialization in which she must engage before she can attain the coveted degree, to become one-sided and narrow in her learning or bigoted in her outlook on life in general? Without a doubt all this depends upon what use she intends to make of her education once she has completed it. If she is working with the desire of ultimately entering some special profession, there is much to be said in favor of rigid specialization. Once established in her profession, she will be working continually along a single line, and it will be of inestimable advantage to her to have obtained, prior to this time, as high a degree of perfection as possible in the knowledge which is necessary to her as a background in the pursuance of that profession. The more thoroughly she has become a master of that knowledge, the more advantageous it is for her, and the surest way to accomplish this is through specialization. Specialization in a subject obviously opens up questions and problems connected with that subject which a mere dabbling in it would never even suggest. It is for this specialization that the degree of Doctor of Philosophy stands—it indicates a fairly complete knowledge of at least one subject.

On the other hand, if the student is pursuing graduate study simply through a love of study, without any particular aim as to the use she will make of it later, specialization is by no means so essential. Roaming about over the whole field of learning at one's will, picking out courses now here, now there, in the different things one loves and in which one is interested after the manner of the dilettante, doubtless are far more amusing than tying one's self down to the minutest details of one narrow branch of knowledge (yet that will, after all, depend to a large extent on the type of mind of the student concerned). It is probably in one sense much more broadening—and yet, a student with a sufficient amount of intellectual curiosity, working in a course however highly specialized, is generally stimulated by the very narrowness of the scope of her daily studies to spend her spare time (provided she has any) seeking out fresh fields of learning for herself, widely separated from her chosen path, and devouring what she finds there with a more than ordinary avidity. There is, too, a certain satisfaction to a student in finishing off a period of graduate study with a higher degree—a satisfaction which could scarcely be felt by a student who has spent a given amount of time in the hit-or-miss pursuing of a heterogeneous collection of courses which lead nowhere and in the end give her nothing as a sign to the outside world of what she has accomplished academically.

These are some of the larger questions which occur to the student as she looks back upon her own period of graduate study and attempts to apply it to the benefits of others in view of the needs which have arisen in her own case in her experience with the world. There are other questions—questions the discussion of which time and space forbid—questions as old as graduate study itself, which, in all probability will continue to perplex even the wisest of students for generations to come. There can be no common solution of these problems which will be applicable to every one. After all, education has to do with individuals, and there are as many tastes as there are individuals.

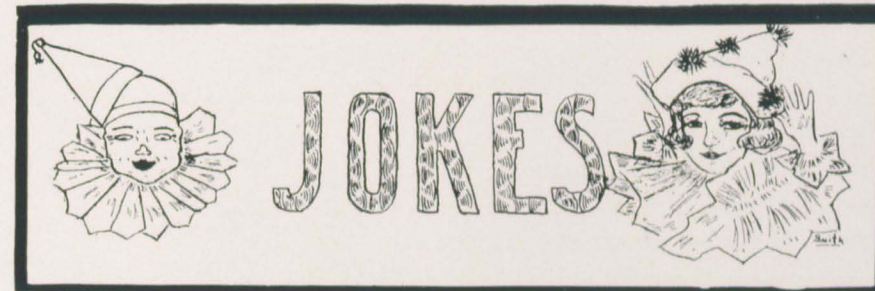
Freshman Lament
