

HOUSING

Hollins is a residential college with about seventy commuters. Students are housed in five dorms, three houses, and an apartment complex.

As a first year student, your room and roommate will be assigned and you will know your roommate's name after you arrive on campus September 9th.

As a member of the class of '82, you will be housed in either Randolph or Tinker Dorm. Most freshmen will be assigned a roommate; some, a private room.

As an upperclass student transferring to Hollins, you will be assigned a roommate from your class in either East, West, Main, Sandusky, Carvin, Tinker, or Randolph. If you request a private room, however, you will be assigned one if available in Tinker Dorm where many upperclass students reside in privates.

Each student room is furnished with a bed,
mattress (36 X 72), mattress cover, a pillow, dresser,
mirror, desk with chair, and lock box or drawer.

Some rooms have draperies provided; other have
venetian blinds. All dormitories have full length
mirrors, cleaning equipment, kitchenettes, lounges,
tv rooms, and study areas.

All room care, including bed making, sweeping, dusting, and general housekeeping is your responsibility. Brooms, dust mops, dust pans, and vacuum cleaners are available. Once a week you may get clean sheets and a pillowcase from the college laundromat if you opt for the linen service, otherwise bring your own bed linen and lots of quarters for the washers and dryers. You are expected to furnish your own blankets, towels, and wash cloths.

The college does not assume responsibility for loss of personal property due to theft, fire, water, and other catastrophes, and you are advised to maintain insurance for your personal possessions.

Because of fire danger and electrical capacity, irons, percolators, space heaters, hot plates and sunlamps may not be used in student rooms. Smoking is permitted, but never on beds, please, and only with regulation ashtrays purchased in the bookshop.

Due to health considerations and respect for all residents and property, no pets, other than fish or turtles, may be kept in college housing.

WARDROBE

What you wear will be determined by your personality and sometimes by the weather. For 1977, the annual mean temperature in the Roanoke Valley was 56.3°; the total snowfall in inches for '76-'77 was 19.2; and the total rainfall in inches for 1977 was 31.33. It was 85° one day in September; 14° one day in December; and below zero several times in January. In September, you will need more cash than the rest of the year. Before deciding your budget, please note that the following expenditures are not included in your tuition fees and may not be charged: room keys, \$1.00 deposit refundable; dorm dues; class dues; Student Government Association dues, \$53.00; private telephone; overnight housing for male guests; snacks at Rathskeller; some campus movies; and post office box, \$3.75.

The following items are also not included in the comprehensive fee but may be charged: books and supplies but not until after the first two weeks of school so bring \$100.00 for them; field trip fees; linen service, \$50.00; automobile registration, \$25.00 for the year; refrigerator rental, \$40.00 per year; dining room meals for guests; dry cleaning; music lessons; and horseback riding.

STUDENT SERVICES

MAIL There is a U. S. Post

BAGGAGE Please use only foot lockers, hand luggage, and luggage-sized boxes. Frowns unlimited on large trunks; they're too heavy and too big for our facilities. If your luggage is to precede you, ship it prepaid to yourself at Hollins College, Virginia 24020, but not earlier than one week prior to the opening of school.

TELEPHONES There are college extension phones in each residence hall for receiving incoming calls, calling on campus, and making local calls.

Pay phones are located in all residence halls for long distance calls. Until you know your extension, you may be reached through the central college number (703) 362-6000. After 11:30 p.m., the central number may handle only emergencies. The C & P Telephone Company will install a private telephone in your room. Application forms for a private telephone may not be mailed to you but may be picked up at the college switch-board office when you arrive on campus.

LAUNDRY Self-service coin operated washing and drying machines are located in Tinker, the Apartments, and the Laundromat. The Laundromat also handles commercial service for laundry, dry cleaning, and storage.

STORAGE Storage rooms may be used at your own risk for luggage, etc. Some articles may be stored over the summer provided they are

fully secured and clearly labeled.

CARS AND BIKES Cars and bikes may be kept on campus however they must be registered with the college Security Police. Automobile registration depends on proof of adequate insurance and liability, and a fee is charged. There is no fee charged for bike registration.

HEALTH Hollins has an infirmary, a college physician, full-time nursing staff, a psychological counselor, and a college psychiatrist. All correspondence concerning your mental or physical health should be made to Dr. Mary Louise Stephens, College Physician.

Your health report must be returned to the office of the college physician prior to September 1, 1978. Students are not allowed to register for classes unless this form is on file.

CHECK CASHING The bookshop will cash

checks up to \$25.00 upon presentation of your Hollins College I.D. card which will be issued when you arrive. There are two banks within walking distance of the college for setting up a checking account in the Roanoke valley:
