

E-books, streaming films and articles via OneSearch: with close to 400,000 e-books, millions of articles and streaming video from three different sources, our online collections are ready for you to explore any topic of interest. Start at the library website: **library.hollins.edu** and don't forget to use your Hollins login for full access.

Research Assistance: academic-level research at its best is a collaborative effort. Maximize your results by consulting with a professional librarian who specializes in exploring databases, journals, books and other sources in your subject area. We are available via phone, email, and Zoom!

BUYING LOCAL FOR EQUITY & JUSTICE

As Hollins strives to achieve goals for diversity, equity and justice, the library has also set our own goals to ensure that our spaces, collections and services are welcoming and accessible for everyone.

One initiative the library pursued this year is a goal set by Humanities Librarian Rebecca Seipp: to purchase books from a Black-owned bookstore in Virginia. She was excited to find one not very far away: Books and Crannies, a woman-owned business which was opened by DeShanta Hairston in 2016 in Martinsville.



Books and Crannies sell new and used books for general interest, both fiction and nonfiction; they also sell books online. On the website, Hairston tells the story of her personal connection to reading and the decision to open her business, to fill a gap in a region which no longer

had any bookstores. If you love independent bookstores - and who doesn't - check them out at booksandcranniesva.com!

At this time, the library purchases mostly from a large vendor who also do the work of processing books before they go on the shelf. To make it feasible for our small staff to manage a change, Seipp identified a specific collection we can order from Books and Crannies: titles for our juvenile collection. With the help of Coleman Holth, the library's Acquisitions and Copy Cataloging Coordinator, we purchased almost all juvenile titles from Books and Crannies this spring, and plan to continue doing so in the future.

LibKey: an easier way to full

Libkey is a full-text finding service which helps connect the library's journal subscriptions to the websites researchers use: Google Scholar, PubMed, publisher pages and more. In addition to finding articles via subscription. LibKev will also find any materials available through Open Access. You can make the most of LibKey with its browser plugin **Nomad**:


