### Reporter Answers Freshman Questions

**Q.** How can I get my trunk?  
**A.** Take your trunk check to Mrs. Wigmore in the business office. She will have the trunk sent here from the station and it will be put on the far end of West Building porch. When you find it there, you give the number of the room and building to the man in charge and pay him fifty cents for transfer charges. Trunks sent by express are put on the porch outside the business office. You go to the post office, give your room number and building and pay fifty cents. The trunk will be delivered to your room.

**Q.** What time are meals served?  
**A.** The regular schedule begins Saturday. Open breakfast hour is held from 7:30—8:00; lunch is at 12:15; and supper at 6:00. Fifteen minutes before these times a warning triangle is rung. Five minutes after the last triangle the President's bell rings and after that one does not enter the dining room.

**Q.** Where do we sit in the dining room?  
**A.** Anywhere except at faculty or senior tables. The latter are distinguished by candles. Always leave the seat at the head of the table for the faculty member. Later you will be assigned a definite table.
