



Oscar night at Hollins arrived last week and killed the curiosity of the many fans who had been calculating who the recipients of the famed awards would be.







Armed convict plagues campus

On April 14, 1971, an evil presence somehow found its way in from the outside world and hovered close to the very heart of our Hollins home.

On that windy Wednesday afternoon, an escaped convict was spotted three places simultaniously on the Hollins campus. From 1:30 p.m., when word was first received that a felon had chosen the Hollins haven for refuge, until late in the afternoon when he was finally picked up, the Hollins campus fairly swarmed with state police and roving red lights.

Rumor had it that the man was five feet tall with black wavy hair and one arm. Some said that he had just escaped from the Middle East.

This report was soon found unsubstantial, however, and the convict was identified as A. C. Walker, escaped from the Statesville prison in North Carolina where he was serving a twelve year sentence for forgery. Evidently he had made his getaway on February 18th while working on a road gang. "I haven't seen such a prime Grade-A display since Freshman Follies," one boy said Friday night. It seems that many male members of the follies audience never really understood what the play was all about.







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Bag bennies, gain pounds

Dr. J. C. Zillhardt returned Tuesday from a special meeting of the Board of Directors of the American Medical Association.

The conference was called by I. M. Tanner of Sun Beach, Florida and was devoted to "The Effects of Sunrays on the Human Body." Dr. Tanner put forth a well-documented thesis that sunrays produce calories within the human body, Dr. Zillhardt reported.

Dr. Zillhardt said that Dr. Tanner studied a group of 150 girls, who sun bathed regularly. Before beginning the actual experiment, Dr. Tanner tested the girls' metabolic rates and regulated their daily caloric intake, so that their weights would definitely remain stable.

A control group of 100 girls (who ate as usual) was studied, also. All girls in the experiment sunbathed for two hours, daily.

After three weeks of careful obesrvation, Dr. Tanner reached the conclusion that one hour of sunbathing produces within the human body a reaction equal to that of taking-in orally 100 calories.

Each of the 150 girls in the regulated group gained approximately 11/2 pounds each week of the experiment, despite their carefully regulated diets. Certain of the control group, however, did not gain weight, which led Dr. Tanner to further experimentation and observation.

It was discovered that they had been eating approximately 2 tablespoons of peanut butter every day (in the form of peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, etc.) After lengthy experimentation, Dr. Tanner discovered that peanut oil had a reactive effect against the sunray calories. Potato chips, Fritos, and the various corn chips also retarded the ray-calories.

The conference ended with Dr. Tanner advising all sun-bathers to eat at least 1 tablespoon of peanut butter (or any of its various forms), when they were planning to spend an hour or more in the sun

"All in all," Dr. Zillhardt concluded, "it was a very interesting conference, and of great value to me, as the Hollins physician."
