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Court hung on decision to instate death penalty

Yell-and Gouge '80, Honor Court chairperson, stated in a press conference today that the Court has voted to include the death penalty in their range of punishments for honor infract-

"We felt that this was a necessary measure. Last year at the end of spring semester we just had too many cases. It was ridiculous. I didn't have time to take my own exams. They brought food from the dining hall up to us while we spent hours in deliberation. This has got to go," said Gouge.

"We experimented subtly with different methods of punishment last year," explained Leslie Badley '83. "We've tried intimidation, persecution and outright bullying, but they just don't seem to do the

Gorge wrapped up the conference by saying that the Court has not yet set a firm policy on how to handle the situation if they decide to use their new punishment. "We think we will probably use a mode of extermination which fits the crime.'

SGA plans sale of bunwarmers by Gray Sweats

"It's really becoming obvious that unless we do something fast, SGA will be in debt big time," said Gin Guzzler '80, SGA treasurer. The budget has encountered numerous problems this year, she outlined.

First, said Guzzler, "the amount of dues was calculated by an estimate of students we thought would enroll. That number turned out to be smaller than we planned for, and we began to get worried over the summer." "Then," she continued, "I sent out that neat letter to everyone over the summer and asked them to pay their dues, telling them all the fun things the dues go to pay for. It didn't help. Tons of people still haven't paid."

Thirdly, "It's also this energy conservation bit. You guys, it's

really no big deal; we thought we could save maybe a few bucks by saving some electricity, but it's not working. Nobody is conserving."

The problem was brought before the SGA Coordinating Council. They voted to appropriate money from the Innovative Fund, until Guzzler voted that the Innovative Fund was the first to go under the new lack of dollars. "We figured that with no money, there could be no innovations."

Guzzler discussed this difficulty with the members of the Co-Co. They have chosen a money-making venture in an attempt to raise funds. After a long debate, the group opted for selling bunwarmers, which looked attractive for a couple of reasons. First, winters have been getting a


little colder, and people would be able to use them. It was also seen as a way to honor Co-Co's illustrious leader, Bionic Buns McAllister.

McAllister thanked Co-Co for the honor. "I'm so delighted that y'all have decided to name the venture after me. I hope we raise lots of money. Go for it!"


