

All about the Class of '85

As with every freshman class, the class of 1985 presents an image all its own. The two hundred and seventy young women comprising the College's newest freshman class are a strong academic group, with varied academic interests. English/Creative Writing is preferred by 18% of the class, while Business/ Economics, Science and Psychology are favored by 11, 10, and 8 percent, respectively. Art is the fifth choice. Pre-law Studies, Foreign Languages and Political Science were each chosen by 5 percent while Mathematics follows closely in popularity.

The incoming freshman represent 34 states and the District of Columbia. They also represent the countries of Norway, Sweden, Belgium, Kenya, Hong Kong, Jamaica, and the People's Republic of

Twenty-three percent of the incoming freshman are Virginia natives while an additional twenty-four percent come from New England and the Mid-Atlantic states. Forty percent of the new students will arrive from the South and Texas and a final ten percent call Western and Mid-Western states home.

The College is a tradition in the families of many young women. Among the new students are twenty-two daughters, five granddaughters and three greatgranddaughters of alumnae. Eighteen students have cousins or aunts that have graduated from the College, twenty are the sisters of alumnae and current students.
