West Splits

West dormitory splintered in two Friday afternoon, sending students fleeing the dorm in terror and injuring three as the Hollins community watched in terror.

The terror started at 2:40 in the afternoon when the floors began to split apart. Within moments, the entire south side of the building had become separated from the northern section, much like the final scene in "Titantic."

"I heard this loud cracking sound," said Macy Good '02. "I was worried about all my friends, except for Sugar Leighton cause I don't really like her."

As terrified students huddled on Front Quad, rescue workers attempted to free students caught in the rubble. Roomates searched for their missing mates as Resident Assistants tried to account for all their residents.

"I just tried to find all my girls and make sure that they were all accounted for," said RA Nicki Mavis '02. "I couldn't find some of them though but rescue searching isn't in my job description. One of my girls was trapped and had to be rescued but I had to take a nap at a friend's."

The split of the dorm was not completely surprising to some students. Many of the doorways and floors in West had been sloping steadily. "When I first got to

school, my doorway was sloped so badly that the door wouldn't close right," said Vic Lobsterbush '01. "And over the year, it just kept getting worse. I knew something like this would happen. I'm psychic, ya know."

"I called the school to see if my son was ok," said Mia Stu-Ped. "Then I remembered that my son went to another school, not Hollins. The school was flooded by calls from concerned parents

Office consolidation creates controversy

Spring is in the air at Hollins, along with divided opinions among students and staff about changes in the locations of many campus offices, including the Career Development Center and the Writing Center.

and the Writing Center.

The Career Development Center, which had been scheduled to be moved to Moody earlier this year from its long time home in West after renovations on the student center are complete, is now located in Starkie.

"I had a dream one morning that Gina Nolan [associate director of the CDC] was in my room," Kate Martin '00 said. "In the dream, I had overslept and she was telling me, 'It's 9:00. Should I remind you what serious consequences this would have in the real world?""

"I woke up in a panic but decided it was just my anxiety over life after the Hollins bubble getting the better of me," Martin said. "Then I realized it was really happening -- the CDC staff had moved into my room while I was sleeping!"

Fellow Starkie resident Alison Turner '00 said, "I love the CDC, but do they need to work in our dorm? I mean, isn't that a fire hazard or something? Plus, now we have to keep the doors to the dorm open during their office hours."

When asked about the CDC's move to Starkie rather

than to Moody as originally planned, CDC director Lillian Manford replied, "I have no idea about why plans have changed. No one told me anything. All of a sudden we were being asked to move into poor Kate's room"

Manford's theory for the change is once it was finally realized bathrooms should be placed on the floor where students eat in Moody, university officials deemed it too late to alter plans involving changes in locations of offices

"Because of Hollins' poor planning, all of these poor seniors living in Starkie in years to come will have to share their room with the CDC for who knows how long," said a frustrated Martin.

However, other students have a more positive attitude about the unexpected change. "With the CDC right there in your bedroom, all the information you could ever want about internships or job openings is right there," Joanna Houseman '01 said. "An added bonus would be constantly hearing everyone is tales of angst and realizing your fears paled in comparison."

Another surprising change for students has been the Writing Center's move from Middle East to the apartments. Writing Center director Lucy Quintenosky explained, "It was time for a change. It's been proven that writers work better with

Security Vanishes

Investigators search for answers

New findings from the Focus on the Protection of Security Committee revealed more questions instead of providing answers.

Concern for the safety of the security officers on campus was aroused at beginning February. The security staff was missing four officers and when questions were asked about their whereabouts no

answers were given.
"I stopped by the office with forms for Officer Krumpkie, and when I asked for him the room became silent and everyone went into the conference room," said B.J. Mopke, Director of Housing. "Five minutes passed and then a voice from the room told me to leave the forms."

Mopke took her concerns to President Rasmuffin, who put together the committee. In late February the committee reported that the missing officers were on a training retreat at an undisclosed location. Suspicion was aroused

when four new security officers were hired. Chief Terry Lou Seedon issued a statement which explained that the new officers had been hired to fill the positions of

the first week of March break. The campus was surprised to receive a broadcast message from Rasmuffin, requesting that all members of the community come to an open forum on March 29 where the committee

The committee intensified their investigation, but the campus heard nothing from them until the week before spring

security officers that had would be discussing their findings. Babble auditorium was filled to capacity. Questions from the student body began before Rasmuffin could begin to speak. Students were angry that more

action was not being taken. Their greatest concern was the two weeks that the campus was without an active security force. Rasmuffin was able to calm to the crowd and introduced

Mopke, who presented the findings.

The situation was much more serious than they had first thought. The training retreat had been a cover story, and the number of missing officers was actually eight. The com-mittee had discovered that the original four officers had been replaced, their replacements had then disap-The peared. campus did not take notice of

the disappearance until after the replacement officers had disappeared. Chief Seedon had begun her own investigation, but her search had left the security office without any clear answers.

The officers disappeared while making rounds on the night of February 1. Officer Krumpkie and Officer Low discovered a patrol vehicle in the grass by the loop with its engine still running. Krumpkie relayed the information to dispatch and said that he and Low were going to conduct a search of the area. Dispatch tried to contact Krumpkie and Low a few minutes later and got no response. Chief Seedon and her two remaining officers conducted a search, but were unable to locate the four officers. The officers that were hired as replacements disappeared in the same way. The only clue that Seedon found at both scenes was a slimy paste-like substance of unknown origins.

Seedon would not comment on what she thinks happened to the officers. She is asking that the campus avoid the area near the creek until more answers are found. The committee is now working with Seedon and her team of investigators in hopes of finding answers.




