Hollins administration approved plans for a select group of men to be kept on campus for students to visit, providing a middle ground for those students wishing to see men without traveling to other campuses, but keeping men out of our classrooms. Funds to construct a small dormitory facility in which to house the men were allocated during a meeting over spring break. The facility will be constructed in the small field behind Siberia parking lot.

Maddie Whipper '03 spearheaded the student group who lobbied for what she terms a "male petting zoo." She's "very thrilled that this dream of mine is finally

becoming a reality! Once this is established, I think this is a program we'll be proud of for years to come. I've already got a wish list of men to put in

the petting zoo, so hopefully I'll be see-

ing a lot of Ben Affleck next spring!" Other students were equally thrilled by the news, as Bella Ridge '05 hopes "that a lot of cute guys will be selected, like Josh Hartnett."

Men will be selected for a semester-long stay on campus after being nominated by students and approved by a student committee. Men may

also volunteer to be in residence on campus, but they must still go through the selection committee for approval. For a small fee,

students will be able to visit with the men for half an hour and feed them snacks. The men will be allowed outdoors in a small fenced area with the visiting students, but must remain inside the designated Male Residency Area, and are not permitted in the dorms, though there are talks of allowing them to attend campus social functions such as Cotillion.

Students interested in serving on the selection committee may submit their resumes and applications to the newly formed Male Residency Office, located in Moody 3P, by the end of this semester. Nomination forms for males will be available April 15, and the office will begin accepting nominations

for males May 1. The head of the Male Residency Office, Bette Merchant, says she hopes "students will take an active part in the decision making process to create the best Male Residency program possible. With their help, we hope to have the finalized list of men by Oct. 14, 2002."



here and now what I want to do with the rest of my life, but I cannot. I fear that picking the wrong option will somehow ruin my life. Sometimes




