ONCE UPON A TIME...

Doing fairy tale research in Wyndham Robertson Library? We have a number of reference works in General Reference (1st Floor) and the Children's Alcove (3rd Floor) to support this research. For general information about tales, try a subject search of *Fairy Tales Encyclopedias* or *Folklore Encyclopedias*.

Trying to find as many versions of Snow White as possible? Try the *Index to Fairy Tales*, which indexes individual fairy tales published in books and collections. Located in 1st Floor Reference Z5983.F17, these indexes are arranged by date, so you'll have to check multiple volumes to be most comprehensive in your search.

Want to dig deeper on a particular theme, character or motif? The Arne-Thompson (AaTh) Classification System organizes individual motifs found in folk and fairy tales. Located in 3rd Floor Children's Alcove (Ref. GR1 .F55) you can search to find multiple tales that include a given motif.

E-BOOKS : NOW DOWNLOADABLE!



Our Netlibrary e-books can now be downloaded to your computer, e-reader or device of your choice!

Netlibrary e-books are found in the library's online catalog. To download the PDF version to your device, first click to view the e-book, then use the Check Out & Download this eBook button. The checkout period lasts for 7 days. Note: about 25,000 of our books can be downloaded; some older editions do not have this feature.

Create an account: To download e-books, you must create a free Netlibrary account using an on-campus computer. For assistance, call us at 540-362-7465. (Note: e-books can still be read at campus-network computers without signing in).

NEW SOURCE FOR THEATRE & DANCE RESEARCH

We are pleased to announce the addition of the **International Bibliography of Theatre and Dance with Full Text** to our library's research offerings. IBTD is the database of record for performance research: fully indexed and cross-referenced, it contains more than 60,000 journal articles, books, book chapters and dissertation abstracts on all aspects of theatre and performance in 126 countries. Of journals included in IBTD, more than 170 are included with full text.



Starting with IBTD guarantees one search of the major journals in dance, drama, and theatre history. IBTD also adds a list of new full-text titles to the library's offerings, including:



FILMS BY GENRE

Finding movies in the library doesn't have to be a hit-or-miss experience: the library website has a page which lists the films we have in any genre. Comedy or drama, horror, foreign films, documentaries, fantasy... just click on "Find Films" and choose the tab for **Genre**. Each link will produce a list of films.

To see what's new in the library, change "system sorted" to "reverse year." If you want to see what Roanoke College has in the same category, just click the "RC" link. DOWNLOADING E-BOOKS CONTINUED

Devices: Netlibrary books can be downloaded to the iPad, iPhone, Barnes & Noble Nook, all four Sony Digital Readers (PRS-300, 505, 600, 700 and 900), as well as the COOL-ER.

Software needed: Portable devices must have the Adobe Digital Editions software, while laptops need Adobe Acrobat eBook Reader software. Finally, iPads, iPhones and iPods also need the Bluefire app: www.bluefirereader.com.


